Treasurer's Report


Les Coleman, FNIL's Treasurer, reports that during 2023 at total of 53 donors contributed \$4,431 to FNIL. The gifts ranged from \$10 to \$1,000. Total expense during the year was \$14,159 as repair and maintenance of the Lighthouse continued. During the last two years a total of \$33,000 was spent on maintenance and repair. At the end of 2023 FNIL's endowment fund at Maine Community Foundation stood at \$64,324, with \$1,900 in its checking account. Les says that continued support of FNIL's donors is critical to FNIL's ability to maintain the Lighthouse for the long-term.



The Lamb and Sheep Report

This spring on Little Nash Island, 25 lambs were born from 23 ewes and 1 ram. On Big Nash Island 91 lambs were born from 86 ewes and 2 rams (Owen and River). Rams Owen and River will be on Big Nash again, while a new ram, Hyas, will be moved to Little Nash Island for next year's tupping season. There was also one bottle lamb this year: Tripp (short for triplet). Tripp was the runt of this year's only set of triplets and needed a little extra support in his first few weeks. We are pleased to report he is happy and healthy!





The Winter Storms

We are happy to report the tower survived the storms unscathed. However, unprecedented changes to the waterfront landscape resulted from winter storms along Maine's coasts. Notably, Big Nash required major rebuilding of the fence line and corral area, the structure of which is crucial to efficient and effective shearing of the sheep.

A large cleanup endeavor was executed on Big Nash consisting of about 15 volunteers who helped fill an entire contractor dumpster full of trash that had washed up over the past couple of years. Be on the look out for clean ups scheduled for Little Nash and Flat Islands. Volunteers are always welcome.
